From Pastor Scott

Before my dad became a pastor, he was an art teacher at a high school in a suburb of Minneapolis while I was a high school student. Even though he was color blind, he loved to paint pictures. I remember our family's summer trip to Washington, DC in 1973 when we got to see the Smithsonian Institute and my dad walked with me through the rooms where paintings by the great masters were displayed. I can't recall the painting that we were standing in front of when he explained to me that many paintings have a foreground and a background. Like this painting of the Mona Lisa, the foreground shows the subject and what is important at the time – the woman who seems to be smiling. The background helps to put her in place and not make it look like she's just floating in the air.

I think about the foreground and the background because they help me remember how we, as Christians, are called to respond in times like this when we hear of COVID-19, the economy, and the uncertainty ahead. Jesus gives us a reminder of the foreground and background of life in Matthew 6:25-34. The foreground of life is the things we're facing right in front of us. They can feel like they're on top of us. The background of life is the invisible unseen spiritual realities that are behind us and hold us in place. These two things aren't divided into the "sacred" and the "secular". They are united, just like Jesus was full man and full God.

In our life now, we may feel that COVID-19, the economy, and our uncertain future are all that we see right in front of us. It is easy to focus on our immediate problems and lose sight of God's divine eternal background that can help us put everything in perspective. We need to remember that it's only the foreground.

In such a time as this, God reminds us that He's not dismissing our concerns but he wants us to keep them in perspective. In light of God's background, Jesus teaches us two things: first to avoid something and second to pursue something. Jesus tells us to not be anxious and then he says, "Seek first the kingdom of God".

What's the reason for our peace? If you look at the first word of Matthew 6:25, you see the word "therefore". Whenever I see that word in the Bible I like to ask myself, "What is it there for?" because it's pointing to something before that Bible verse that tells my why I should do something or why it is true. The reason for our peace in an anxious time? Because God sees, He hears, He knows. God cares and he supplies our needs.?

Our problem gets to be that we only look at the foreground of life and ask the wrong things. We ask things like "What if I don't get...? What if this happens...? What if my needs...?" So, what does Jesus do? In Matthew 6:26, Jesus brings the background of life into our view. He says, "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they?". Jesus gets us to see the background of life – that if God provides for the birds, he'll do even more for us as His children.

You may be asking today, “Where is God?”. That’s why I like the name of our church family – Immanuel... “God with us”. God is in both the foreground and the background of our lives today – He’s in ALL places.

The question that brings peace, hope and strength is “Who is my God? Who is our God? What do we believe as Christians?”. I believe in God the Father Almighty... that’s the background of our lives and our faith.

Then, Jesus says, “Seek first the kingdom”. In Matthew 6:32, Jesus connects our anxiety with our seeking. He says, “The pagans (that’s those who don’t believe in God) run after these things: health, wealth, and material possessions – the physical things of life that we can touch. That’s all that unbelievers want and that’s all they talk about. That’s why they’re anxious about losing it.

See what Jesus is saying here? Our anxieties – our worries – show what is important to us in our life. We get anxious about the things we put our hope in. That’s why, earlier in Matthew 6, Jesus says that where your treasure is your heart will be also. In other words, whatever you’re hoping in - what you investing your time, talent and treasure in – is going to have a tight grip on your heart.

So, it’s almost like Jesus is telling us, “If you want to be anxious about something, let it be the kingdom of God.” Jesus is saying to not put our ultimate hope in this life but put into the life we will have after our physical death. So, seeking the kingdom of God involves two things: remembering our hope of heaven and showing that love of Jesus in our world here and now. Christians 2,000 years ago took Jesus’ words to heart and changed the world. God is giving us a chance as His people to do it again.

Now, we’re not going to be able to share God’s love with other people perfectly, but we know the One (Jesus) who has. In Jesus’ life he had an attitude of peace and sacrificial actions of love. Even when he hung on the cross, he asked God to forgive those who crucified him. The things that God requires of us, Jesus has already fulfilled for us – for all of those who put their faith in him. We not saved by our peace and love for others. We’re saved by Jesus’ love for us and trusting in that love as we share it with others.

My friends and faith family of Immanuel, as people who call themselves Christians, we are called to be a witness to the kingdom of God in this uncertain time. In the coming weeks and months ahead, may God lead us in how to do that in creative and helpful ways with our family, neighbors, community and our world.

2. Giving App:





